EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

This course explores the complex interplay between conflict, violence, and socio-economic development, focusing on the causes, consequences, and potential resolutions of various forms of conflict. The course draws on an extensive body of literature and real-world examples to examine how violence and warfare shape, and are shaped by, economic, political, and social systems.

The course emphasizes both conceptual understanding and methodological rigor. It addresses key topics such as democratic peace theory, the economic consequences of war, the roots and impacts of civil wars, and the role of social trust in post-conflict development.

Structure and Goals

1. Conceptual Overview: Introduce key theories and debates in the study of conflict and development, such as the democratic peace theory, economic explanations for war, and the greed vs. grievance framework for civil wars.
2. Applied Learning: Equip students with the tools to analyze real-world conflicts through the use of datasets, case studies, and empirical methods.
3. Historical and Contemporary Insights: Provide a comprehensive view of historical trends in violence and conflict.
4. Critical Appraisal: Develop students' ability to critically evaluate the social and economic consequences of conflict, as well as strategies for fostering trust and development in post-conflict settings.

Course Objectives

By the end of the course, students will:

1. Understand the types and causes of conflict and their relationship to development.
2. Learn about the economic and political consequences of warfare using theoretical and empirical approaches.
3. Evaluate the role of trust, social capital, and governance in rebuilding post-conflict societies.
